

# MEDICAL ETHICS BIOS 215

## **Course Description**

The course gives students the opportunity to explore the world of medical concepts from both contemporary and historical perspectives. Students are provided with an apprenticeship in concept clarification, concept evaluation, and argument. They are taught the specific skills to inquire, reason, and make judgments. The history of medical ethics, major views medical issues such as the conflicts between different types of benefits to patients, physician duties, or patient autonomy are discussed.

- Achieve familiarity with some basic ethical frameworks how these ethical frameworks can help us think through contemporary question in Medical Ethics.
- Distinguish the role of Ethics in Medicine.
- Recognize Ethical Issues in each topic.
- Think clearly and carefully through your own positions on important issues in contemporary medical ethics and the compatibility of these positions with broader Philosophical commitments (i.e. what is a person, what rights do persons have).
- Express your views clearly in class discussion and engage the views of your classmates.
